

Pulmonary Embolism

A pulmonary embolism (PE) is a potentially life-threatening condition that occurs when a blood clot forms in one of the pulmonary arteries, which are the blood vessels that supply the lungs. The clot typically originates from a deep vein thrombosis (DVT) in the legs, where it can break loose and travel through the bloodstream, eventually blocking one of the arteries in the lungs.

Symptoms of a pulmonary embolism can vary depending on the size and location of the clot. Common signs and symptoms may include:

- 1. Sudden shortness of breath, which may worsen with exertion.
- 2. Chest pain or discomfort, which may be sharp and worsen with deep breathing or coughing.
